**** Birch/ASDAN Class ***

In our English lessons this term we have been looking at movie reviews. This involved reading a selection of internet reviews in order to identify the key features before discussing why people may read them. We then took a trip to the cinema to watch Madame Web which the children then reviewed in order to offer their (often quite strong) opinions.



In maths, our primary topic has been Geometry and



Measure. The children were taught how to both read and draw scale maps, as well as how to accurately give directions using bearings. Their final challenge for the module was to plot a route from Land's End to John

O'Groats. In the last week, we have started to look at how algebra can be used to find the answers to maths problems, and this will be continued in term 5.

In PSHE we have completed the 'Responsibility and Consequence' Roadwise module. We have discussed how peer pressure can influence the behaviour

of young people and how this can play a significant role in causing road traffic incidents. We have also discussed what you should do if you're involved in a minor traffic accident and the pupils each created a 'reminder card' offering a step-by-step guide.

This term Silver Birch Class have been learning about the Ancient Egyptians. They have researched facts about everyday life, and details about Howard Carter the archaeologist who discovered the tomb of King Tutankhamun




containing over 5000 artefacts and why it was such an amazing discovery.


**** Willow Class ***
